Everyday Spanish Tips

Have you ever walked into a Mexican Restaurant and were intimidated about the menu language? Or experienced the challenge of communicating to a Latino co-worker? You may be surprised that you are already some Spanish words- rodeo, burrito, señorita, amigo, and Los Angeles.

Here are some helpful thoughts on the Spanish language.

Spanish Guidelines

Spanish and English have a number of cognates. Cognates are words that sound and look similar or exactly the same in two different languages. For example, the word "café" is the word "coffee." The "pharmacy" is "farmacia" in Spanish.

You don't have to sound like Antonio Banderas when you speak Spanish. Many Americans won't speak Spanish because they sound like "Americans." When native-Spanish speakers speak English, they don't sound like Harrison Ford.

The question "¿Cómo se dice... en español?" (COH-moh say DEE-say en e-SPAHN-yole) can be your best friend. It translates to mean "How do you say...in Spanish?" If you don't know how to say "sweater" in Spanish, you would ask "¿Cómo se dice 'sweater' en español?"

There are four keys to learning any language. They are speaking (hablando), listening (escuchando), reading (leyendo), and writing (escribiendo). Try listening to a TV show in Spanish or put Spanish subtitles on a movie.

Some Common Phrases

Hello! Thank you!	¡Hola! (OH-lah) ¡Gracias! (GRA- see-ahs)
Yes!	Si! (SEE)
No!	No!
What is your name?	¿ Cómo se llama usted? (COH- moh say YAH- mah OO-sted)
My name is…	Me llamo… (may YAH-moh…)
Water Sir	Agua (AH-gwah) Señor (sehn- YORE)
Ma'am (married)	Señora (sehn- YORE-ah)
Ma'am (unmarried)	Señorita (sehn- yore-EE-tah)
